Some herbal insect repellants:

Spot on tick and flea repellent.

3-4 drops of each

peppermint oil

cinammon oil

lemon grass oil

clove oil

thyme oil

Fill equal amounts in a small jar with eye-dropper lid. Shake well.

Apply along spine starting with shoulders and finish at base of tail. Part hair all the way so it soaks into the skin. 4 ml should be used up to 40# adjust for dogs greater or lesser in weight. Apply every two weeks if necessary.

**Fly, Flea, Tick, Bee, & Mosquito Repellent**

Ingredients are full strength essential oils:

Tea Tree Oil

Rosemary Oil

Sage Oil

Cedarwood Oil

Peppermint Oil

Orange Oil

Lavender Oil

Eucalyptus Oil

Rose Geranium Oil

Citronella Oil

## Pine Needle Oil

cheap vodka (as a preservative) - approx 4 ounces per 16 ounce bottle distilled water

### Directions:

Mix 2-3 drops of each with 16 oz. spray bottle. IF you choose to make a stronger mix, go easy on the Tea Tree oil - too much can be toxic. Also, the citronella oil smells horrible in large doses.

Shake before each application. Lightly spray over entire body.

Repels fleas, ticks, mosquitoes, flies, and also makes the car and crate/bed smell great.

Spray lightly on dogs and blankets. Use before going Tracking or into the outdoor ring. It's also effective for use on humans too.

## DANDRUFF IN PUPPIES

Cheyletiella is a large mite that can cause problems in any age dog, but is most commonly associated with puppies. The parasite causes a mild skin disorder often referred to as "walking dandruff." While the problem is not nearly as severe as either Demodex or Sarcoptes, Cheyletiellosis can be a real nuisance, especially in kennels where multiple litters are raised each year.

### Description

Cheyletiella yasguri is the species that most commonly affects dogs. It is an actual tiny walking mite that is larger than most other skin mites found in dogs.

### Means of Infection

The mite is very highly contagious, especially between puppies. The most common source of infection is direct contact from one dog to another.

### Location in the Dog

This parasite has a predilection for locating on the rump and along the back. It is also sometimes found on the top of the head and on the nose.

### Life Cycle

The entire life cycle of Cheyletiella is spent on one host.

### Clinical Signs

Infestation with Cheyletiella produces mild scratching. This syndrome is normally not associated with hair loss unless the puppy is so irritated that it licks or bites some of its hair out. The mite, by itself, does not destroy hair follicles. The course of infection with this mite can be rather lengthy, sometimes affecting pups for many months.

### Diagnosis

The skin of pups with "walking dandruff" will appear somewhat scaly and scurfy. Often, with the naked eye or hand-held magnification, one can see the mites moving through the hair. Deep skin scrapings are not necessary to detect this mite! The easiest way to diagnose this skin infection at home is to comb through the scaly area onto a piece of black paper. Then, carefully watch to see if the tiny white specks move on the paper.

A good rule I use is this: Scurfy-looking dandruff with scratching in 2-10 week old puppies is highly suggestive of cheyletiellosis.

### Treatment

Fortunately, this mite is comparatively easy to eradicate. The parasite is killed by simple bathing or dipping the puppy with virtually any insecticidal product. Medications with carbaryl or pyrethrins are very effective. Treatment should be repeated three times at 7-10 day intervals.

I would suggest treating all dogs in a kennel if Cheyletiellosis is found. It has been proven that some adult dogs can harbor the organism and not appear infected. Although mites do not live long off the host, an effort should be made to clean the premises. It is even best to keep all dogs out of an infected kennel for seven days.

Any new animals being added should be carefully inspected and appropriately treated if in doubt.

#### Zoonotic Note

Humans can become infected after contact with an infected animal. Skin lesions will appear reddened and crusty and will itch. Constant contact with infected animals is needed to maintain human infections, otherwise the condition lasts about three weeks and will clear up.

### **Top 10 Human Medications That Poison Our Pets**

Although pet parents are well aware of poisons lurking around their home, many don't realize that some of the biggest culprits are sitting right on their own nightstands. In 2007, the ASPCA Animal Poison Control Center received 89,000 calls related to pets ingesting over-the-counter and prescription medications. To help you prevent an accident from happening, our experts have created a list of the top 10 human medications that most often poison our furry friends.

If you suspect your pet has ingested any of the following items, please call your veterinarian or the ASPCA Animal Poison Control Center's 24-hour hotline at (888) 426-4435. And remember to keep all medications tucked away in bathroom cabinets—and far from curious cats and dogs.

#### **NSAIDs**

NSAIDs (non-steroidal anti-inflammatory drugs) like ibuprofen or naproxen are the most common cause of pet poisoning in small animals, and can cause serious problems even in minimal doses. Pets are extremely sensitive to their effects, and may experience stomach and intestinal ulcers and—in the case of cats—kidney damage.

#### **Antidepressants**

Antidepressants can cause vomiting and lethargy and certain types can lead to serotonin syndrome—a condition marked by agitation, elevated body temperature, heart rate and blood pressure, disorientation, vocalization, tremors and seizures.

#### **Acetaminophen**

Cats are especially sensitive to acetaminophen, which can damage red blood cells and interfere with their ability to transport oxygen. In dogs, it can cause liver damage and, at higher doses, red blood cell damage.

#### **Methylphenidate (for ADHD)**

Medications used to treat ADHD (Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder) in people act as stimulants in pets and can dangerously elevate heart rates, blood pressure and body temperature, as well as cause seizures.

#### **Fluorouracil**

Fluorouracil—an anti-cancer drug—is used topically to treat minor skin cancers and solar keratitis in humans. It has proven to be rapidly fatal to dogs, causing severe vomiting, seizures and cardiac arrest even in those who've chewed on discarded cotton swabs used to apply the medication.

#### **Isoniazid**

Often the first line of defense against tuberculosis, isoniazid is particularly toxic for dogs because they don't metabolize it as well as other species. It can cause a rapid onset of severe seizures that may ultimately result in death.

#### **Pseudoephedrine**

Pseudoephedrine is a popular decongestant in many cold and sinus products, and acts like a stimulant if accidentally ingested by pets. In cats and dogs, it causes elevated heart rates, blood pressure and body temperature as well as seizures.

#### **Anti-diabetics**

Many oral diabetes treatments—including glipizide and glyburide—can cause a major drop in blood sugar levels of affected pets. Clinical signs of ingestion include disorientation, lack of coordination and seizures.

#### **Vitamin D derivatives**

Even small exposures to Vitamin D analogues like calcipotriene and calcitriol can cause life-threatening spikes in blood calcium levels in pets. Clinical signs of exposure—including vomiting, loss of appetite, increased urination and thirst due to kidney failure—often don't occur for more than 24 hours after ingestion.

**Baclofen**

Baclofen is a muscle relaxant that can impair the central nervous systems of cats and dogs. Some symptoms of ingestion include significant depression, disorientation, vocalization, seizures and coma, which can lead to death.
